






Evaluation Report

Q1: Please indicate your profession




Q2: Please advise your health board area






Q3: The purpose of the morning session was to give an update to an ICC community on latest national developments/pathways/guidelines. Would you say this objective had been met?




Q4: How relevant were the following presentations to your educational needs?





Q5: How do you rate the overall quality of education provided by the event?




Q6: What impact will this event have on your future practice?

- Improved knowledge in particular of Long QT which was very interesting and important especially given John Dean's case discussion where QT was normal until standing/supine ECG done
